# Limited Access: Using NCPL's Genealogy Room to Access Digitized Newspapers & More


Newspapers not only give us information about world and state news, they also give information about a community as a whole, often providing clues for genealogical research. Not only can we find ancestral names associated with a place and date, we find ads for community businesses, marriages, deaths, weather, and other everyday life events. Included here are only a few snippets that anyone can find by visiting the genealogy room of Nelson County Public Library.

The following are just a few examples of items found in the newspaper collection. It's clear how they can help with genealogical research. Note that many articles with information on happenings in Nelson County are published in other places, such as Hardin County, so it pays to check news from surrounding counties. Also note that family or friends from other counties, visiting Nelson County, are listed along with their places of residence.

The following entries were taken from our digital newspaper collection. As you read them, think about how you can use this tool in the research and documentation of your family history.



#### 2. Spencer County-

Taken from the same issue of the Nelson County Record:

In nearby Taylorsville, a resident of the county poorhouse was killed by a handcar in the night.

John Jackson was found lying dead at the foot of the Montgomery trestle, about 1.5 miles north of Taylorsville. A handcar, loaded with people traveling at night from Bloomfield, supposedly knocked Jackson from the trestle in the dark. This is the first death notice I've found where the deceased was victim of a handcar.<sup>2</sup>

#### 3. Gethsemane


Several family research clues are in this notice. Historically, we see that the Head & Beam Distillery "stopped" last week. A week prior to this August 1st paper would have been July 25, 1889.

rungeg GETHSEMAN NELSON COUNTY. Wheat threshing and oats cutting over. Several farmers sold their wheat, seventy cents per bushel being the highest price received. School in district No. 40 has commenced. Miss Fannie Masterson, of New Hope, is the teacher. Head & Beam's distillery stopped last week. James S. Baird, of Slulphur Lick, shipped sixty-three hogs to Louisville a few days ago. They averaged about two hundred pounds, and brought four and onehalf cents. Miss Lula Brown and Sam Steele, of Louisville, are visiting relatives near here. Sam Dant is sick. Miss Vida Miller is spending this week with Miss V. M. Pottinger. Sam Pottinger has returned from Pineville, where he spent several days with friends. Superintendent McKay visited school last week Joe Warner and Rowan Clark went to Fredericktown last Saturday, presumably to attend the pic-nic. Prof. E. W. Elrod is in this neighborbood in the interest of Lynnland Female College, of which he is the principal. Butler Pottinger has been very ill for several days with intermittent fever, and at this writing is no better. Solicitors for the St. Vincent's are canvassing among us



## 1. Botland


Anyone interested in the history of the Botland community will find it interesting to know that their post office closed in the winter of 1914.

#### 2. Bardstown



Of course it was advised to estimate additional lodging costs at \$1.00 in the best private homes or \$2.00 a day in good hotels. The last statement in fine print instructs that the L & N Agent has a printed list of Rooming Houses and Hotels for customers to view.

#### 3. New Haven

A horse and mule sale at the site of the Joseph H. Pottinger Horse Company, 1.5 miles from New Haven, was advertised in the 5 Feb 1914 issue of The Kentucky Standard. This is a great find if your family tree includes this man, or if you are interested in local history.

### 4. Washington County

Death notice for Fred Carrico, funeral at St. Dominic's. Originally posted in the Springfield Sun, it was common for newspapers to copy, reprint, or rewrite news from other communities if a local person/group had connections there. Note that at the end of the obituary, --Springfield Sun is typed.

# **Nelson County, Kentucky Newspaper Abstracts Book (1807-1890)**

# The Candid Review, Tuesday, September, 22, 1807

**Lewis Quigley** has just received from Philadelphia, large quantity of copper and he flatters himself, will be enabled to furnish stills and other copper ware on low terms. Highest price given for old copper.<sup>10</sup>

All those who have subscribed for the building of the Academy at Bairdstown, will find their subscriptions in my hands, and immediate payment is required, with discriminiation, **John Weller.** <sup>11</sup>

## Bardstown Repository, Wednesday, June 23, 1819

A \$5 reward for a runaway from the subscriber on Thursday, Dec. 24, last, **Samuel King**, an indented apprentice to the art of printing. He is about 5 feet, 6-8 inches high, dark complexion, black hair, blue eyes, down look, has but little talk, when spoken to has a smiling appearance or grin. At the same time discovering a short or broken tooth above, left handed. Had on when he ran away, dark grey cloth coat and waistcoat grey corded pantaloons, black fur hat and half boots. The above reward will be given any person who will deliver to me in Bardstown, the said runaway, or confine him in any jail in this state and give me speedy notice so that I can get him, **John P. Edrington**, Jan. 20, 1819. 12

# Statewide Newspapers, Abstracted and Indexed

Beginning with a Newspaper Abstract book can save time in pinpointing the name of the newspaper, date, and main content. Some of these types of books also include a Placename and Subject Index. Such is the case with the abstracts book, The Kentucky Gazette, 1787-1800. Examples include: Bardstown, Chaplain's Creek, Saltworks, Nelson County (94 entries contained reference to Nelson County), Simpson's Creek, Distilleries, Rolling Fork, Tobacconists, and many more places and subjects. If an abstract reveals the person, date, or place being sought, it's always best to view the full article or page, if possible. 13

Also in this book are abstracts of political significance. The entire pages of these newspapers can be viewed on <a href="www.newspapers.com">www.newspapers.com</a>. There is a yearly subscription fee if viewing from home, but the site can be used in the Genealogy Room thanks to a subscription held by the Nelson County Public Library for its patrons. This subscription is only available in the Genealogy Room of NCPL.

Ways to search for specific names or subjects in the digitized newspapers of the genealogy room are varied.

- 1. Narrow your focus to a particular year and just scroll through each issue until you find what you are looking for.
- 2. Beginning with a specific year in mind, follow the written directions posted beside computer # 1. This may seem time consuming, but once the procedure is remembered, the many steps to this will hopefully yield positive results. One of the genealogists can help with this procedure. \* Caveat: The tool for searching these (ocr .pdf) is only about 70% accurate. That means if you think you have the correct year, and the search does not yield anything, you may need to change the search term or go back to method 1 from above.
- 3. Search the index of the newspaper abstract books to narrow search. The compiler included all known issues of the newspaper in these books so this may be the best option if you have no idea which year, newspaper, etc...you need. I have solved several brick wall situations using these books prior to searching the actual newspapers.
- 4. Log on to <a href="www.newspapers.com">www.newspapers.com</a> and ask one of us for help if needed. Once there, type in a search term, range of dates, and place name. If results do not appear, change the search term, date range, or place name...(or leave the place box blank). Try again.

Finally, be sure to **cite any source that you copy, print, or use in your research**. This way, you know exactly where you found an item and if you decide to create an article or book, all of your citations can be copied and pasted. Keeping a typed list (Bibliography) of your sources can save time. Copy and paste the citation and edit it for page numbers, etc...in any new document you create. Example: You wish to create a book to share with family and some of the same books or census records are used for multiple family members. If they are already typed then you can simply copy and paste to the new page and you won't have to type them over and over.

## A Few Sources in the Genealogy Room of NCPL

- **Digitized and searchable newspapers** including The Kentucky Standard, The Catholic Advocate, as well as previously published papers such as The New Haven Echo and The Nelson County Record. This collection contains issues as far back as the 1800s.
- **Digitized scrapbooks** that contain news clippings from local and other newspapers; photos, and more.
- A subscription to Newspapers.com, free for patrons to explore within the genealogy room.
- Newspaper abstract books. These are summaries of news items bound into books here in the Genealogy Room, most of which were compiled by Carolyn Wimp. We have abstract books from Nelson County, Hardin County, Larue County, Breckinridge and Green County, here in the genealogy room. Others include state newspaper abstracts. These abstracts are from papers as early as the 1700s. Other newspaper abstract books we have are 2 volumes of The Kentucky Gazette (1700s-very early 1800s) and Early Louisville, Kentucky Newspaper Abstracts, 1806-1828.
